



BACK TO 1814

THROUGH its direct predecessors the insti-tution now known everywhere as West Virginia University reaches back over a period of nearly one hundred years. Monongalia Academy was established in 1814 and existed as a prosperous school of high grade until it became a part of the new university in 1867. At the same time Woodburn Seminary,

now stands, was merged into the new and larger institution. Since the year 1867 the words college and university have taken the place of academy



THE COLLEGE OF ARTS and SCIENCES offers courses, partly prescribed but largely





The Big Organ




The river, the hills and four of the buildings.




