BERKELEY SPRINGS is a beautiful town, the county seat of Morgan county, located in a high, healthy mountain district where thousands visit annually in search of health. As a cure for rheumatism, this mineral water is surpassed by none in the whole world. It is used for drinking and bathing purposes.

Driving and horseback riding is indulged in by a large number of summer guests as the country abounds in very beautiful scenery. Four miles from here on the Cacapon mountain is what is known far and wide as Prospect Rock, from the summit of which a large portion of Morgan county and a vast part of Maryland can be seen. From this point can be seen the old historic Potomac River with Dam No. 6 across it at the village of Great Cacapon, as well as Horseshoe Bend in Cacapon river. The view from this point is considered by a number of tourists as one of the best they have ever seen. The eye can see for miles up and down, and the view includes many of the graceful bends for which the Potomac is famous.

in the old Bath Record, are the names of General George Washington, General Horatio Gates, Charles Carroll, of Carrollton, Edward Lloyd, Fielding Lucas, and many others known to the history and social traditions of those days.
