
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

HISTORY

of the

Monongahela Valley Trades and Labor Council

The Monongahela Valley Trades and Labor Council was oganized in 1911 with seven Local Unions, under the name of The Independent Trades Council of Marion County. In 1913 its present name was adop-The Trade Union movement at the time this body was organized had not progressed to any great extent. The Council was organized with seven Local Unions. At this time the Miners, Barbers, Street Car Workers, Plumbers, Culinary Workers, were not organized. The Council has been useful in many ways in the uplift and progress of the workers. The purpose of this organization is to organize the unorganized, to act as a medium in adjusting grievances of its membership with the employer, and uniting the forces of labor. This Council at present has forty-five Local Unions affiliated, representing ten thousand organized workers. The membership of this body was directly instrumental in the purchase of the Jackson Hotel which is being used as a Labor Temple, owned exclusively by the organized workers of this vicinity. The fundamental principal of this organization is co-operation of the workers a hope in view of successfully working out the destiny of the workers.

The officers of the organization at the present are Geo. W. Wegman, President; Alex J. Boyd, Vice President; Joe R. Diggs, Secretary; Geo. P. Hunter, Treasurer. These officers along with the representative delegates of this body, extend a cordial invitation to all Trades Unions that are not affiliated to seek membership with us, to aid in working out the destiny of the toiling masses.

Why The Farmer--Should Join The Farmer and Labor Party of West Virginia

* * *

The farmer has the first call upon civilization because he first laid the foundation upon which society rests, and the industrial worker has a broad sympathy for those engaged in farm pursuits. We do not lose sight of the trials and hardships which the tillers of the soil are compelled to undergo and we believe that the products of the farm, including all stock under one year old, should be exempt from taxation.

The farmers are entitled to an income that will provide a suitable standard of living. We insist that farmers be assured prices for their products that will meet the cost of production and in addition thereto a reasonable margin of profit.

To enhance the opportunity of the farmers to fulfill their functions as producers, we demand that they be assured credit facilities as cheap and as available as those offered any other legitimate and responsible industry.

We favor farmers' markets free and open, without taxation in order that the producer and consumer may deal directly without being compelled to pay tribute to the "middle man."

We also advocate a uniform school term with ultimate object of placing within reach of every child an opportunity to secure at least a high school education. Why should the country boy be compelled to enter the race of life less well equipped than the city boy?

Successful agriculture is the basis of all national prosperity. The building of improved roads will go far to stimulate production, and it will be our purpose to insist that all road money raised by bonding or otherwise, be so prudently handled as to secure federal aid, dollar for dollar, for the extension of a state system of highways.

We hear the cry: Back to the farm, and every thinking man recognizes the soundness of that cry but who is foolish enough to expect such a cry to secure success under existing conditions?

WHY SCHOOL TEACHERS AND EVERY PERSON WHO BELIEVES IN BETTER EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS, SHOULD JOIN THE WEST VIRGINIA FARMER LABOR PARTY.

We favor compensation to teachers from rural school to the university that will encourage those now engaged in the profession to remain, and to make the profession sufficiently attractive and promising to retain them. When teachers can lay down their profession and command more money carrying a sample case or swinging a coal shovel, keeping books, then the greatest institution of our state—public education—is going to suffer, and with it the welfare of our beloved commonwealth. suffer, and with it the welfare of our beloved commonwealth.

Moreover, it is palpably unfair to demand of our teachers that
they toil for a compensation too inadequate for their support
and any adjustment of the wage for teachers should recognize
the fact that teachers must live for twelve months every year.

We favor free school books with the proviso that those who
wish to do so may own their own books. Poverty is not a crime,
and the children should not be denied the opportunity of an ed-

ucation because their parents are dead or are too poor to buy the necessary books. The idea of compulsory attendance is sound, but its usefulness is destroyed unless we furnish books

to those who cannot buy them.

RESULTS OF AGREEMENT VS. ANTAGONISM.

It pays to be fair to union labor, to have its confidence and to establish mutual trust and respect. Perhaps nothing in recent months has proved the truth of this oft-repeated and oft-demonstrated fact more dramatically than the remarkable "come-back" of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, which was one of the first railroads to reestablish relations with the striking shopmen, composed of seven organizations affiliated with the Railway Employees' Department, American Federation of Labor.

"Since the Baltimore and Ohio reached an amicable agreement with the union shopmen, the road has been making such progress that the financial writers and experts of the nation's leading newspapers and business publications have been applying such terms as "phenomenal" and "extraordinary" to its earning statements. They point to the gross revenues of the B. and O. for the first four months of 1923, which establish new high records each month and declare that the road should do even better in the remaining months of this year. The results obtained by the B. and O. are hailed as proof that the road has pulled itself from the "Slough of Despond," in which inefficient management and union-hating policies plunged many railroads in the last few years.

While some railroads have been spending millions of dollars in hiring and "entertaining" inefficient strike-breakers, the Baltimore and Ohio has been taking freight and passenger business away from the Pennsylvania Railroad and other of its rivals who have been attempting the costly pastime of operating with non-union shopmen. The New York Central Railroad, which followed the example of the B. and O. and settled with the shopmen, has also been taking business away from the Pennsylvania. Meanwhile the Pennsylvania continues to fulminate against the union shopmen and to ship worthless strike-breakers to its shops, where frequently they desert in a few days and move on to pastures new.

There could be no more striking demonstration of the benefits of working in cooperation with union labor than the results obtained by the Baltimore and Ohio. It is a record that many a railroad head could study with profit and the assurance that following the example of the Baltimore and Ohio would result in profit to his railroad, its employes, its stockholders, the public it serves and his own personal reputation for ability as a manager and executive.—American Federationist.

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

SLOW TO ACKNOWLEDGE.

Lenine and Trctzky looked upon the organizers of productive industry as non-producers, as mere "capitalists." They seized the property of these organizers of industry and either slaughtered them or drove them out of the country.

It is to be hoped that the lesson will not be lost upon those people in the United States who are inclined to listen to bolshevist sophistry. We have successful organizers of industry in this country. Our great advancement has been due to the skill and energy of men who began at the bottom of their various lines of endeavor and 'earned the business from the bottom up. Those men organized our great productive enterprises, our transportation system, our banking system and our agencies for the rapid transmission of news, and for communication by the telegraph and telephone and by wireless. Our great flour mills our lumber mills and our packing plants were established and built by organizers of industry.

If the United States were to turn bolshevist these men would be deprived of their property; they would be murdered or exiled, and in a few years the new rulers would be admitting as the bolshevists in Russia now admit, that "our main trouble is that we do not know how to organize production."

The sober-minded people of this country will do well to check the bolshevist movement in its incipiency for it leads straight to destruction.—Herald-Dispatch.

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Loyal workers repudiate Judas conferees and stand committed to the codes and roads of Lincoln and Washington.

Voting in blocks, Gompers' men rally around their great leader and by a vote of 27,838 to 130, impeach William F. Dunne, communist augur-head, of Silver Bow council, revoke his credentials and expel him from the hall.

A four-hour thorough discussion of the radical situation preceded the dramatic event.

Dunne, disciple of W. Z. Foster, is thus prevented from further boring-in operations. Michigan will later attempt his conviction for violation of the anti-syndicalism act.

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
