

### Broaddus Female Gollege

Was established at Winchester, Va., in September, 1871, under the leadership and management of Rev. E. J. Willis.

It was removed to Clarksburg, W. Va. in February, 1876, and was incorporated under the laws of West Virginia in 1877.

The school was conducted under the administration of Rev. Mr. Willis until the year 1885, when he resigned the Presidency, and the school was reorganized under the present administration.

Arrangements are being perfected by which the Baptist denomination of the

Arrangements are being perfected by which the Baptist denomination of the
State will assume more directly the ownership and control, as well as the responsibility of this school. It is now in the hands of a committee appointed by the
West Virginia Baptist General Association. And, while, for this reason, it ought
to have a much larger patronage from Baptists throughout the State, it will not be sectarian in its character so as to prevent the fullest freedom of thought and action in religious matters

tion in religious matters.

The School commends itself to the people of the State and adjoining States as worthy of confidence and a generous and hearty support. The President an educator of long experience, and a corps of efficient teachers are prepared to give to our daughters in West Virginia a course of instruction as complete and thorough as can be given at any of the first class schools in the adjacent States.

#### Location.

It is believed that no point in the State of West Virginia contributes more advantages for such a school for young ladies. It is accessible from every direction by railroad. No more healthful location can be found in or out of the State than Clarksburg. The College, while in the corporation, is retired from the bustle of the town, located in a beautiful grove, with delightful exercise grounds.

Buildings.

The main building is a substantial three-story brick edifice 40x70 feet with a stone basement. New Hall is a wooden structure 30x55 feet. There is also another wood building 20x80 feet. There are accommodations for about forty boarding students. The rooms for the young ladies have been newly carpeted and newly furnished. The beds and bedding are all recently purchased new. Each room is provided with a walnut bureau, wardrobe, washstand, table, chairs and other necessary articles.

The Boarding Department

Is under the immediate care of the President and his wife, whose desire and aim is to make the regulations conform as nearly as possible to the standard of a well-governed family. The desire is to make the pupils feel that they are among friends. In sickness the most careful attention is given.

### Government.

The Government is parental in its character. Such appointments and rules of onduct are arranged for the young ladies as seem necessary to secure diligence, promptness and neatness. But the restrictions are only such as are necessary for discipline of mind and character, and no pupil can be exempted from them. Such amusements and diversions are allowed as is, in the estimation of the President consistent with home and Christian life. dent, consistent with home and Christian life.

Library.

During the past year there has been made a beginning of a College Library. Through the contributions of friends about 150 volumes are now on its shelves, while papers and periodicals cover its table. Contributions are solicited, for books, periodicals and papers are a necessary part of the equipment of an Institution of Learning.

### Sessions,

The school year is divided into four quarters, beginning respectively the first Wednesday in September, the third Wednesday in November, the fourth Wednesday in January and the first Wednesday in April.

#### Examinations.

At the close of each quarter written examinations are held in each study, which, with the daily class standing, determine the average of the student.

### Reports.

Reports of standing and deportment are given out regularly at the close of each quarter, and a record kept of the standing of each young lady for future reference. If parents are properly interested in these reports, they may greatly aid in the benefit and advancement of the pupils.

Payment for board and tuition is required quarterly in advance. This requisition is absolutely necessary to the success of the school. In case of protracted sickness deductions will be made for the excess of over two weeks of continued loss of time.

Whatever incidental expenses are incurred, depends upon the disposition of

the parent or guardian.

\*\*Bach young lady is required to furnish a pair of sheets and pfilow cases, a pair of blankets, towels, toilet soap, table napkins, a napkin ring and a knife and fork and teaspoon for her private room, and each must be supplied with an umbrile over shoes and cossesses. brella, over shoes and gossamer.

No charge for tuition of daughters of Ministers of the Gospel, who are devoting

themselves to their calling, except in the Ornamental Department.

Students will be held responsible for damages done to the rooms or furniture occupied by them.

Meals served in private rooms, extra.

It is especially desired that the dress of the student be simple and inexpensive. Simplicity saves time, thought and money to a scholar, valuable for nobler purposes than mere personal adornment.

#### COURSE OF STUDY.

### Primary and Preparatory Departments.

These Departments take beginners and those who are slightly advanced, and prepare them, carefully and systematically, to enter with advantage upon the higher studies of the Collegiate Department.

### Collegiate Department.

Junior Year.—University Arithmetic completed, Elementary Algebra, Physiology, History, Latin Grammar and Reader.

Junior Middle Year.—Algebra completed, Natural Philosophy, Rhetoric, English Literature, Botany, French or German, Cæsar, Virgil.

Senior Middle Year.-Geometry complete. Trigonometry complete, Ancient and Modern History, French or German, Virgil, Cicero.

Senior Year.—Physical Geography, Geology, Astronomy ernment, Mental and Moral Science, Evidences of Christianity. Astronomy, Analysis of Gov-

#### REMARKS

Pupils present at the beginning of the session secure the best advantages in the school department, as the classes are then organized. As frequent absences are productive of great evils to the pupil herself, and to the school, a smaller number of pupils punctual and regular in attendance, is preferred to a greater number whose attendance is irregular; hence punctuality and regularity are insisted upon. The good of the whole School requires it.

It is much better for the pupils and for the discipline of the School that no special privileges be asked by the parents or guardians for their daughters or wards. The months embraced within the school year are devoted to earnest work, and interruptions interfere most seriously with the progress of the pupils, therefore, absence for a single day, or from a single recitation, should, if possible be avoided.

Although the Institution is under the auspices of the Baptist denomination, no improper influence will be used to interfere with the religious predilections of those who may become its pupils. The expressed wish of parents or guardians will be regarded as to churches where their daughters or wards, who board in the school shall require the attent wards where their daughters or wards, who board in the school, shall regularly attend worship.

#### CONDITIONS.

1 Young ladies placed in this Institution must be subject to the regulations while they remain in it. This condition is imperative and should be understood before entering.

stood before entering.

2. As this Institution is responsible for the proper advancement of its pupils, students living in Clarksburg will be expected to remain in school from 9 o'clock a.m. to 12 m. and from 1:30 to 4 p. m.. subject to the regulations of the school.

3. Young ladies will not be allowed to visit in town except at such places as may be especially designated by parents, or by permission from parents, given through the President, and then at his discretion.

4. Receiving visits or letters from gentlemen is not allowed except by permission from parents or guardians, given directly to the President.

5. No visitors are admitted on the Sabbath. The young ladies are not allowed assemble in each other's rooms. They are required to attend Sabbath-school in the morning, and church services morning and evening, unless especially excusto assemble in each other's rooms. They are required to attend Subotant-School in the morning, and church services morning and evening, unless especially excused, and observe strict order and propriety on that day. Each student will be expected to help defray church expenses in the church of her choice, while at school.

6. All letters must be put in the College letter-box to be mailed.

7. No correspondence allowed by parents will be interfered with.

13 We earnestly request parents and pupils to read carefully the above conditions, and to co-operate in their enforcement.

Fyoung ladies from abroad, who attend this School, will find great advantage by boarding in the College.
