



THE OLD SPRING.







HOW WEBSTER SPRINGS IS REACHED.

WEBSTER SPRINGS is the county-seat of Webster County, West Virginia, and is located in a beautiful valley of the Allegheny Mountains, at an altitude of two thousand feet above sea level.

It is reached by the West Virginia Midland Railroad, formerly the Holly River & Addison Railroad, connecting with the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad at Holly Junction. Direct connections are made with through trains from New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore and Washington and good connections from Pittsburgh, Wheeling and Cincinnati and intermediate points. Have trunks checked through to Webster Springs.
