

CHAPTER ----

AN ACT making appropriations of public money to pay general charges upon the treasury.

February 25, 1899. In effect from its passage. Approved February 25, 1899.]

it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:

SECTION 1. There shall be and are hereby appropriated out of the State fund for the fiscal year ending September thirtieth, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, the following sums for the purposes as follows:

Penitentiary.

For salary of the warden, one thousand five hundred dollars. For salary of the clerk and commissary, one thousand dollars.

For salary of the physician, six hundred dollars.

For salary of the chaplain, one hundred and fifty dollars.

For deficiency in ordinary expenses for one thousand eight undred and ninety-seven and ninety-eight, eleven thousand x hundred and eighty-one dollars and forty-eight cents.

For salary of matron, four hundred dollars. For general repairs, one thousand dollars.

For new shop, one thousand dollars.

For dining hall, new kitchen and equipments, fifteen hundred dollars.

For contingent expenses, five thousand dollars.

For burial ground fence and removing bodies, five hundred dollars.

For electric plant, twenty-five hundred dollars.

For erection of building in which to execute death penalty, three thousand dollars.

Criminal Charges.

For criminal charges, one hundred thousand dollars. For extradition of criminals, two thousand dollars.

Lunatics in Jail.

For support of lunatics in jail, three thousand dollars.

Historical Society.

For the West Virginia Historical and Antiquarian Society, fifteen hundred dollars, for salary of Librarian and for the purpose of collecting, purchasing and preserving relics, books, printing and stationery, etc.; the articles which may be collected by said fund to be and remain the property of the State, and to be held in trust by said society for the State.

Normal School.

For the support of the Normal School and its branches, according to the provisions of sections ninety-six and nixety-seven of chapter forty-five, of the Code, as amended by the Acts of the Legislature of 1899, twenty-five thousand and two hunderd dollars.

For salary of Secretary, three hundred dollars.

For traveling expenses of board of regents, eight hundred dollars.

Deficiency incurred previous to October first, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, five hundred and fifteen dollars and eleven cents.

For the education and normal school training, of colored teachers, to be paid according to provisions of section ninety-six of chapter forty-five of the Code, one thousand five hundred dollars.

For deficiency due Thompson & McCullough for insurance on Marshall College, three hundred dollars.

For deficiency due J. H. Grogg for insuring Glenville Normal School, two hundred and one dollars and sixty cents.

For deficiency due Lohmeyer & Goshorn for insuring dormitory at Athens, sixty-one dollars and twenty-five cents.

For deficiency due F. E. Nichols for insuring Fairmont school,

ninety-three dollars and seventy-five cents.

For deficiency due Sands & Ravenscroft for insuring Fairmont school, one hundred and eighty-seven dollars and fiftycents.

To pay H. L. Snyder for services as secretary of Normal Board of Regents for the years one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three and one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, two hundred dollars; the same to be accepted in full of said claim.

Marshall College.

For library and apparatus, five hundred dollars. For fencing and paving, five hundred dollars. For contingent expenses, six hundred dollars. For building and repairs, five hundred dollars.

For library and apparatus, six hundred dollars. For fuel, four hundred dollars.

For fencing, paving, etc., five hundred dollars. For contingent expenses, five hundred dollars. For building and repairs, five hundred dollars.

For janitor, three hundred dollars.

For steam heat for dormitory, one thousand dollars.

For teachers' salaries, twenty-four hundred dollars.

For janitor, three hundred dollars.

For fuel, lights and incidentals, four hundred dollars. For library and apparatus, five hundred dollars.

For contingent expenses, one hundred dollars.

For board of regents' expenses, three hundred and fifty dollars

For furniture for dormitory, due Dawley Furniture Company,

eight hundred and eighteen dollars and sixty-one cents.

For insurance, (deficiency), one hundred and fifty dollars.

For grading, tiling and walks, two hundred and fifty dollars.

For fence, three hundred and fifty dollars.

For water rent, one hundred and fifty dollars, (deficiency due for two years).

For water rent, seventy-five dollars.

For completing first wing of building, twenty-five hundred dollars.

For furnishing first building, one thousand dollars.

For stable, five hundred dollars.

Bureau of Labor.

For salary of commissioner of labor, twelve hundred dollars.

For salary of assistant commissioner of labor, eight hundred dollars.

For contingent expenses, one thousand dollars.

State Board of Agriculture.

For total expenses, including salaries of officers, seven thousand dollars.

For deficiency to pay for animals killed, and for the services of the veternarians who made the examination and report,

four hundred and five dollars.

For carrying into effect the provisions of chapter nine, Acts of one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, for destruction of diseased animals, eight hundred dollars.

Inspectors of Mines.

For salaries of inspectors of mines, five thousand and two hundred dollars.

For traveling expenses, twenty-five hundred dollars. For contingent expenses, three hundred and fifty dollars.

For deficiency, (borrowed in May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, from the Kanawha Valley Bank, Charleston, W. Va.), one hundred and twenty-five dollars.

For clerk hire, three hundred dollars.

Bank Examiner.

For salary of bank examiner, seven hundred dollars.

For publishing statements, three hundred and seventy-five dollars.

State Board of Health.

For expenses of state board of health, fifteen hundred dollars.

For contingent expenses, one hundred dollars.

And so much as shall be paid into the treasury by said board as fees for examinations, to be paid by the Auditor upon the order of the board, under provision of section seventeen, of chapter seven, of the Acts of one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five.

Commissioners of Pharmacy.

For commissioners and secretary, five hundred dollars, to be paid by the auditor upon the order of said commissioners.

Vaccine Agents.

For vaccine agents, to be paid on the order of the Governor, one hundred and fifty dollars.

Civil Contingent Fund.

For civil contingent fund for the governor, eleven thousand dollars.

Contingent Fund-Executive Department.

For contingent expenses of the treasurer's office, four hundred dollars.

For contingent expenses of attorney general's office, four hundred dollars.

For contingent expenses of the auditor's office, two thousand dollars.

For contingent expenses of state superintendent of free school's office, to be paid out of the general school fund, two thousand dollars.

For the purchase of books for the office of the state superintendent of free schools, to be paid out of the general school fund, two hundred and fifty dollars.

For expenses to be incurred under provisions of Article twelve, section two of the Constitution, five hundred dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary, to be paid out of the general school fund.

For contingent expenses of secretary of state's office, one thousand dollars.

For contingent expenses of adjutant-general's office, five hundred dollars.

For contingent expenses of the state librarian's office, three hundred dollars,

For furniture for library, fifty dollars.

The Auditor is authorized to pay from the balance in the treasury on account of the appropriation for purchasing and placing metal file cases in auditor's office, such additional metal furniture as may be needed, and the residue he is authorized to use in copying such books of record, as in his judgment may be expedient and necessary, and he is directed to make an itemized report of the expenditure to the next Legislature.

The foregoing appropriation to be drawn upon the requisisition of the officers to whom said funds are respectively appropriated, and who shall render a detailed account by items, showing what the expenditures are for, at each meeting of the

legislature, of the funds so expended.

Contingent Legislative Expenses.

For contingent expenses of the senate, five thousand two hundred dollars.

For contingent expenses of the house of delegates, seven thousand dollars.

Salaries of Clerks.

For salary of Governor's private secretary and assistant, twenty-two hundred dollars.

For salary of chief clerk of secretary of state, twelve hundred

dollars.

For three other clerks, one thousand dollars each.

For salary of chief clerk in treasurer's office, one thousand two hundred dollars.

For assistant clerk in treasurer's office, eleven hundred dol-

lars

For salary of chief clerk in auditor's office, one thousand five hundred dollars.

For other clerks, six thousand and seven hundred dollars. For salary of assistant in attorney general's office, twelve hundred dollars.

For salary of stenographer of attorney general, five hundred

dollars.

For salary of clerk in office of state superintendent of free schools, to be paid out of the general school fund, twelve hundred dollars.

For salary of assistant clerk in office of state superintendent of free schools, to be paid out of the general school fund,

nine hundred dollars.

For salaries of assistants in office of state superintendent of free schools to be paid out of the general school fund, nine hundred dollars.

Judicial Department.

For salary of assistant clerk of supreme court of appeals, one

thousand dollars.

For contingent expenses of supreme court of appeals, to be expended on the order of the court, one thousand and five hundred dollars.

For stenographers and typewriters for supreme court of ap-

peals, one thousand two hundred dollars.

For printing and binding supreme court reports, two thousand dollars.

The Militia.

To carry into effect the provisions of chapter 61, of the Acts of one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, relating to the militia, twenty-five thousand dollars, which amount shall cover all the expenditures for the militia for said fiscal year.

Provided, That this sum shall be disbursed under the direction of the governor, adjutant general and paymaster general,

upon requisitions made on the auditor.

For deficiencies in expense of mobilizing the first and second regiments for enlistment, twenty-one thousand five hundred and eighty-eight dollars, payable upon the requisition of the governor.

To continue work on civil war records, provided for by chapter 73, Acts of one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven,

seven hundred and fifty dollars.

Capitol Building and Grounds.

For repairing and re-painting capitol building, to be expended under the direction of the board of public works, five thousand dollars.

For repairs and furniture for governor's office, one thousand

and five hundred dollars.

For water, nine hundred dollars. For gas, one thousand dollars.

For coal, nine hundred and fifty dollars.

The board of public works shall make a contract for the delivery of the coal appropriated for; and the board shall from time to time, as the contractor delivers the coal, make an order directing the auditor to issue his warrant upon the treasury in payment for said coal, but no such order shall be made unless the contractor produces to the board his own affidavit and the affidavit of the person at the capitol authorized to receive the coal, showing the number of bushels delivered and the date of delivery, said affidavit shall accompany the order of the board and be filed in the auditor's office.

For deficiency due gas company, two thousand seven hundred

and sixty-one dollars and ten cents.

For deficiency due water works company, six hundred and

ninety-seven dollars.

For money due on ground purchased, (principal two thous and dollars; interest, one hundred and twenty dollars,) two thousand one hundred and twenty dollars.

For electric light plant, three thousand dollars.

To erect a suitable fire proof building in the city of Charleston, located on one of the squares facing the Capitol, but not in the rear of the Capitol, for the use of the Supreme Court of Appeals and its clerk's offices, the state library, the Historical Society and the auditor's and treasurer's offices, thirty thousand dollars. The said appropriation to be drawn and expended, and the said building contracted for and built by the Board of Public Works at a price and cost not exceeding sixty thousand dollars, after the plans and specifications for said building and its location shall have been selected and adopted by the Governor, the President of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of Delegates, the Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Senate, the Chairman of the Finance Committee of the House, or any three of them, and after the title to the lands upon

which said location shall be so made, shall be vested in the state of West Virginia, without cost to it, and such plans and specifications so adopted, donated to the state.

Over-Paid Taxes.

For refunding over-payments made at the treasury on account of taxes, licenses, fines and commissions, to be paid out of the fund into which they were paid, such amount as may be necessary for such purpose.

Erroneous Assessments.

For refunding taxes erroneously assessed, collected and paid into the treasury, to be paid out of the fund into which the taxes were paid, such amount as may be necessary for such purpose.

Erroneous Payments Into Treasury.

For refunding moneys erroneously paid into the treasury, such sum is hereby appropriated as may be erroneously so paid, payable out of the same fund into which paid.

For Distribution of General School Fund.

For the distribution of the general school fund, such amount is hereby appropriated as may be duly apportioned by the state superintendent of free schools, to each county, payable out of the general school fund.

For the pay of county superintendents of schools, to be paid out of the general school fund, according to the provisions of section fifty-three, of chapter forty-five of the Code, fifteen thousand dollars

For Refunding County and District Taxes.

For refunding to counties, county, district and municipal taxes paid into the treasury for redemption of land, such amount is hereby appropriated as will be necessary to refund to the counties, districts and municipal corporations, entitled thereto, the taxes so paid into the treasury.

For refunding county, district and municipal taxes, paid into the treasury by railroad companies, such sum is hereby appropriated as will be necessary to refund to each county, district and municipal corporation the amount of such taxes as may be paid into the treasury to the credit of such county, district or municipal corporation.

For Pay of State Agents.

For compensation of state agents, such amount is hereby appropriated as may be necessary to pay the commission of state agents, payable out of the funds collected: *Provided*, that in no case shall the amount exceed ten per centum of the funds so collected and paid into the treasury.

For payment of the expenses of the state agents for special services under authority and directions by the auditor in and about the collections of claims due the State, one thousand

dollars.

Reassessment of Real Estate.

For the purpose of carrying into effect the provisions of an Act passed by this session, entitled, "A bill to provide for the reassessment of the value of all the real estate in the State," and for the purpose of paying all necessary expenses attending the same, there is hereby appropriated out of the moneys in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, such sum or sums as may be necessary, the same to be paid by the auditor after the completion of the services rendered and expenses actually incurred.

Institute Instructors.

For compensation of institute instructors, provided for in section thirty, of chapter forty-five, of the Acts of one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five, one thousand dollars out of the general school fund.

For additional expenses for conducting institutes, two thou-

sand dollars out of the general school fund.

State Library.

For purchasing and binding books for state library, twelve hundred dollars, to be drawn on the order of the supreme court of appeals, and expended under the direction of the said court, and all books furnished or purchased by this appropriation shall be the property of the State.

Insurance.

For premiums on insurance on public buildings, to be placed as the board of public works may direct, ten thousand dollars, to be drawn from the treasury upon the order of said board.

Printing, Binding and Stationery.

The unexpended balance of ten thousand three hundred and twenty-nine dollars and nine cents for printing, six thousand four hundred and sixty-seven dollars and ninety-two cents for binding, and three thousand nine hundred and four dollars and thirteen cents for stationery, remaining in the treasury at the end of the fiscal year ending September thirtieth, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, are hereby re-appropriated for the purpose of printing, binding and stationery, and in addition to the foregoing sum, the following amounts are hereby appropriated, for the purposes following:

For public printing, five thousand dollars. For public binding, five thousand dollars.

For supplying printing paper and stationery, for State use, including the office of state superintendent of free schools, fifteen thousand dollars; but all printing, binding and stationery for the use of the state superintendent of free schools, shall be paid out of the general school fund.

The board of public works shall make a contract for the delivery of the coal appropriated for. The board shall, from time to time, as the contractor delivers the coal, make an order directing the auditor to issue his warrant upon the treasury in payment of said coal; but no such order shall be made unless the contractor produces to the board his own affidavit and the affidavit of the person at the capitol authorized to receive the coal, showing the number of bushels delivered and the dates of delivery; said affidavit shall accompany the order of the board and be filed in the auditor's office.

Overpaid Taxes.

For refunding overpayments made at the treasury, on account of taxes, licenses, fines and commissions, to be paid out of the fund into which they were paid, such amount as may be necessary for such purpose.

Erroneous Assessment.

For refunding taxes erroneously assessed, collected and paid into the treasury, to be paid out of the fund into which the taxes were paid, such amount as may be necessary for such purpose.

Erroneous Payments Into Treasury.

For refunding moneys erroneously paid into the treasury, such sum is hereby appropriated as may be erroneously so paid, payable out of the same fund into which paid.

For Distribution of General School Fund.

For the distribution of the general school fund, such amount is hereby appropriated as may be duly apportioned by the state superintendent of free schools, to each county, payable out of the general school fund.

For the pay of County Superintendents of Schools, to be paid out of the General School Fund, according to the provisions of section fifty-three, of chapter forty-five of the Code, fifteen

thousand dollars.

For Refunding County and District Taxes.

For refunding to counties, county, district and municipal taxes paid into the treasury for the redemption of land, such amount is hereby appropriated as will be necessary to refund to the counties, districts and municipal corporations, entitled

thereto, the taxes so paid into the treasury.

For refunding county, district and municipal taxes paid into the treasury by railroad companies, such sum is hereby appropriated as will be necessary to refund to each county, district and municipal corporation the amount of such taxes as may be paid into the treasury, to the credit of such county, district or municipal corporation.

For Pay of State Agents.

For compensation of State Agents, such amount is hereby appropriated as may be necessary to pay the commission of State Agents, payable out of the funds collected; *Provided*, That in no case shall the amount exceed ten *per centum* of the funds so collected and paid into the treasury.

For payment of the expenses of the State Agents for special service under authority and directions by the Auditor, in and about the collections of claims due the State, one thousand dol-

lars.

Institute Instructors.

For compensation of institute instructors provided for in section thirty of chapter forty-five, of the Acts of one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five, one thousand dollars, out of the general school fund.

For additional expenses for conducting institutes, two thous-

and dollars, out of the general school fund.

State Library.

For purchasing and binding books for the State library, twelve hundred dollars, to be drawn on the order of the supreme court of appeals, and expended under the direction of the said court, and all books furnished or purchased by this appropriation shall be the property of the state.

Printing, Binding and Stationery.

The unexpended balance of eight thousand, three hundred and eighty-five dollars and fifty-three cents for printing, one thousand, seven hundred and ninety-three dollars and forty-two cents for binding, and ten thousand, three hundred and sixtynine dollars and eighteen cents for stationery, remaining in the

treasury at the end of the fiscal year ending September, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, are hereby re-appropriated for the purpose of printing, binding and stationery; and in addition to the foregoing amounts, the following amounts are hereby appropriated for the purposes following:

For public printing, five thousand dollars. For public binding, six thousand dollars.

For supplying printing paper and stationery for state use, including the office of the state superintendent of free schools, ten thousand dollars; but all printing, stationery, binding and paper, for the use of the office of the state superintendent of free schools, shall be paid for out of the general school fund.

All printing, binding and stationery for the adjutant general and for the militia, shall be paid for out of the appropriation

for the militia.

Code.

To pay for the fourth edition of the Code, as provided for by House Joint Resolution No. 11, adopted at this session, fifteen

thousand dollars.

When said fourth edition shall have been compiled and is ready to be printed the same shall be submitted to the governor and attorney-general for examination, and if found by them to conform to the requirements of said resolution, they shall so certify, and when the required number of copies shall have been printed, bound and delivered to the secretary of State and the same finally approved by the governor and attorney-general, it shall then be the duty of the governor to cause the same to be paid for.

Be it further enacted by the legislature of West Virginia:

SEC. 3. The appropriations herein made to the State penitentiary, the Normal school and its branches, the West Virginia Schools for the Deaf and Blind, the West Virginia University, the preparatory branch of the West Virginia University at Montgomery, the Hospital for the Insane at Weston, the Second Hospital for the Insane at Spencer, the West Virginia Reform School, the West Virginia Colored Institute, the Bluefield Colored Institute, the West Virginia Industrial Home for Girls, the West Virginia Asylum for the Incurables, shall be drawn from the treasury upon the requisitions of the boards of directors, and boards of regents of such institutions, made upon the Auditor, at such times and in such amounts as may be necessary for the purpose of such institutions.

SEC. 4. The regents and directors of the following institutions, viz: the Penitentiary, the State normal schools, West Virginia Schools for the Deaf and Blind, University, preparatory branch of the University at Montgomery, Hospital for the Insane at Weston, Second Hospital for the Insane, West Virginia Reform School, West Virginia Colored Institute, Bluefield Colored Institute, West Virginia Industrial Home for Girls, West Virginia Asylum for Incurables, shall only be allowed the necessary expenses incurred by them in discharging their duties as such, and four dollars per diem for each day they may be employed as such, and an itemized account shall be made a part of their report to the governor, and no mileage shall be allowed or paid.

SEC. 5. All stationery, printing and binding shall be purchased and paid for out of the expense or contingent expense funds, herein appropriated to the following institutions and objects, viz.: the Penitentiary, State Normal Schools, West Virginia Schools for the Deaf and Blind, University, Preparatory Branch of the University at Montgomery, Hospital for the Insane at Weston, Second Hospital for the Insane, West Virginia Reform School, West Virginia Colored Institute, Bluefield Colored Institute, West Virginia Industrial Home for Girls, and West Virginia Asylum for Incurables, Bureau of Labor, State Board of Agriculture, Inspectors of Mines, and State Board of Health.

SEC. 6. No sum of money shall be paid out of the treasury during the fiscal year ending September thirtieth, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, and September thirtieth, one thousand nine hundred, beyond the amount hereby appropriated, unless the same be provided for by the Constitution or some general law; but in addition to the sums hereby appropriated for each of said fiscal years, the auditor may, after the expiration of said fiscal year ending on the thirtieth day of September, one thousand nine hundred, and during the first six months of the fiscal year beginning on the first day of October, one thousand nine hundred, make payment to the following institutions, officers and persons, upon proper vouchers, of sums of money, not exceeding in the aggregate one-half of the amount appropriated for the same purpose for the fiscal year ending September thirtieth, one thousand nine hundred.

For charges, salaries of officers and running expenses, other than items for buildings and betterments, that is to say: For criminal charges, for support of lunatics in jail, for the militia, for the penitentiary, for the state normal school and its branches, for the West Virginia Schools for the deaf and blind, for the West Virginia University, for the preparatory branch of the West Virginia University at Montgomery, for the hospital for the insane at Weston, for the second hospital for the insane, for the West Virginia reform school, for the West Virginia colored institute, for the Bluefield colored institute, for the West Virginia asylum for incurables, for the bureau of labor, for the state board of agriculture, for inspectors of mines, for bank ex-

aminer, for the state board of health, for the commissioners of pharmacy, for the office of librarian, for the office of adjutant general, for clerks in executive offices, for printing and binding supreme court reports, for refunding overpaid taxes and erroneous assessments, for public printing, binding and stationery, and for paying all proper charges, which may be presented to him for payment; for refunding to counties and districts taxes for county and district purposes, upon lands redeemed at the auditor's office, and also taxes assessed against railroads for county and district purposes. And there are hereby appropriated, out of the state fund for the fiscal year ending the thirtieth day of September, one thousand nine hundred and one, sums sufficient to make the payments authorized by this section.

Sec. 7. The Auditor is hereby authorized to make the necessary entries on the books of his office, disposing of the arrears for taxes, licenses and fines due from sheriffs for the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one to and including one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, and to allow such compensation as he may think reasonable to the State agents for the collection thereof, such compensation to be paid out of the money so collected, upon the approval of the Attorney-General.

Sec. 8. The superintendents of the several public institutions of the State shall furnish to the board of directors or regents of the respective institutions, itemized accounts of all moneys paid out on account of appropriations for contingent expenses and repairs, and when audited and allowed, the directors or regents, respectively, shall include such itemized accounts in their reports as are directed by law to be made. Every warrant or requisition upon the Auditor for any part of the moneys herein or hereby appropriated for the Penitentiary, the University, the Hospitals for the Insane, and the schools for the Deaf and the Blind, and the Reform School, shall be accompanied by a statement of the treasurer or other financial officer of such institutions, showing how much money is in their hands to the credit of such institution on the day such draft or requisition is forwarded for payment, and the disbursing officers of the various contingent funds are hereby required to furnish the succeeding Legislature an itemized account of the distribution of said funds.

SEC. 9. All boards of regents, boards of directors or other boards or officers authorized by this act to issue orders or requisitions upon the Auditor for payment of money out of the State treasury, shall, before any such money is paid out of the State treasury, certify to the Auditor that the money for which such order or requisition is made, is needed for present use for the purpose for which it was appropriated, and the Auditor shall not issue his warrant to pay any money out of the State treasury, unless the same is needed for present use for such purpose.

CHAPTER ---

AN ACT making appropriations of public money to pay members of the Legislature and for salaries of the officers of the Government in pursuance of the forty-second section of the sixth article of the Constitution.

[Passed February 24, 1899. In effect from its passage. Approved February 25, 1899.]

Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:

SECTION 1. There shall be and are hereby appropriated for the fiscal year ending September thirtieth, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, the following sums of money for pay of members and officers of the legislature and for salaries of officers of the government.

Legislative Department-Senate.

To pay mileage of the twenty-six members of the senate and of M. B. Morris, contestant, declared not elected to his seat, for the session commencing on the eleventh day of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, the sum of one thousand one hundred and ninety-nine dollars and eighty cents.

To pay per diem compensation for twenty-six members of the senate and twenty-eight days per diem for M. B. Morris, contestant, declared not elected to his seat, from the eleventh day of January to the eighth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, inclusive, the sum of four thousand seven hundred and ninety-two dollars.

To pay D. M. Shirkey, contestant, found not elected to his seat, from the eleventh day of January to the twenty-fifth day of January, inclusive, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-

nine, fifty-six dollars.

To pay J. H. Collins, contestant, to his seat, from the sixth district, from the eleventh day of January to the twenty-fifth day of January, inclusive, fifty-six dollars.

To pay per diem compensation of the officers, assistant clerks,

committee clerks, pages, etc., that is to say:

To the clerk of the senate, five hundred and fifty dollars.

To eight assistant clerks, two thousand one hundred and sixty dollars.

To eleven committee clerks, one thousand nine hundred and

eighty dollars.

To nine pages, eight hundred and ten dollars.

To sergeant-at-arms and assistant sergeant-at-arms, four hundred and fifty dollars.

To two door keepers and one assistant door keeper, five hun-

dred and forty dollars.

To the cloak room keeper and assistant cloak room keeper, one hundred and eighty dollars.

To pay the librarian of the senate, one hundred and eighty

dollars.

To pay the stenographer, two hundred aud seventy dollars. For *per diem* and mileage to William Campbell, contestant, *versus* H. C. Getzendanner, from the thirteenth senatorial district, one hundred and forty-seven dollars and twenty cents.

For per diem and mileage to A. J. Stevenson, contestant, versus E. G. Pierson, from the ninth senatorial district, sixty-

six dollars.

To pay W. B. Parkhurst for swearing in the members of the Senate, eight dollars and fifty cents.

House of Delegates.

To pay mileage of seventy-one members of the House of Delegates and of Charles M. Via and Humphrey F. Brohard, contestants, declared not elected to their seats, and W. R. Dent, contestee, for the session commencing on the eleventh day of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, the sum of two thousand nine hundred and fourteen dollars and twenty cents.

To pay per diem compensation of seventy-one members of the house of delegates, and six days each per diem for Charles M. Via and Humphrey F. Brohard, contestants, declared not elected to their seats, from the eleventh day of January to the sixteenth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, inclusive, twelve thousand nine hundred and eighteen dollars.

To pay per diem compensation of the officers, assistant clerks,

committee clerks, pages, etc., that is to say:

To the clerk of the house of delegates, five hundred and fifty dollars.

To eleven assistant clerks, two thousand nine hundred and seventy dollars.

To extra clerk, three hundred and sixty dollars.

To twelve committee clerks, two thousand one hundred and sixty dollars.

To one stenographer, one hundred and eighty dollars. To two printing clerks, three hundred and sixty dollars.

To private secretary of the speaker, one hundred and eighty dollars.

To sixteen pages, one thousand four hundred and forty dollars.

To sergeant-at-arms, two hundred and twenty-five dollars.

To assistant sergeant-at-arms, two hundred and twenty-five dollars.

To door-keeper, two hundred and twenty-five dollars.

To gallery door-keeper; two hundred and twenty-five dollars.

To librarian, one hundred and eighty dollars.

To two cloak-room keepers, two hundred and seventy dollars. To Edwin M. Keatly, for swearing in members of the house of delegates, thirty-five dollars and fifty cents.

Executive Department.

To pay salary of governor, twenty-seven hundred dollars.

To pay salary of auditor, two thousand dollars.

To pay salary of treasurer, fourteen hundred dollars.

To pay salary of the secretary of state, one thousand dollars. To pay salary of the attorney-general, thirteen hundred dollars.

To pay salary of the superintendent of free schools, to be paid

out of the general school fund, fifteen hundred dollars.

To pay salary of the adjutant general and ex-officio superintendent of weights and measures, one thousand two hundred dollars.

To pay salary of state librarian, one thousand dollars.

To pay salary of janitor, one thousand dollars.

Judicial Department.

To pay salaries of judges of the supreme court of appeals, eight thousand eight hundred dollars.

To pay deficiency in salary of judge of the supreme court of

appeals, one hundred dollars.

To pay salaries of the judges of circuit courts, twenty-five

thousand two hundred dollars.

To pay deficiency of salaries of judges of circuit courts, three thousand three hundred and fifteen dollars and seventy-six cents.

To pay compensation allowed by law to persons who hold the circuit courts when the judges of the circuit courts can not act, twenty-five hundred dollars.

To pay salaries of the judges of the criminal and intermediate

courts, twelve thousand six hundred dollars.

To pay deficiency in salaries of judges of criminal and intermediate courts, one thousand seven hundred and ninety-six dollars and ninety-one cents.

To pay compensation allowed by law to persons who hold criminal and intermediate courts when the judge of the same

cannot act, five hundred dollars.

To pay mileage of the judges of the supreme court of appeals, seven hundred and fifty dollars.

To pay deficiency in mileage of judges of the supreme court of appeals, five hundred dollars.

To pay mileage of judges of the circuit courts, three thousand

dollars.

To pay deficiency in mileage of judges of the circuit courts,

five hundred dollars.

To pay salary of clerk of supreme court of appeals, one thousand dollars.

For Keeper of Rolls.

For salary of keeper of the rolls, three hundred dollars.

Be it further enacted by the legislature of West Virginia:

2. That there shall be and are hereby appropriated for the fiscal year ending September thirtieth, one thousand nine hundred, the following sums for salaries of officers of the government:

Executive Department.

To pay salary of the governor, twenty seven hundred dollars.

To pay salary of the auditar, two thousad dollars.

To pay salary of the treasurer, fourteen hundred dollars.

To pay salary of the secretary of state, one thousand dollars.

To pay salary of attorney general, thirteen hundred dollars. To pay salary of the state superintendent of free school, to be paid out of the general school fund, fifteen hundred dollars.

To pay salary of adjutant general and ex-officio superintend-

ent of weights and measures, twelve hundred dollars.

To pay salary of state librarian, one thousand dollars.

To pay salary of janitor, one thousand dollars.

Judicial Department.

To pay salaries of judges of the supreme court of appeals, eight thousand and eight hundred dollars.

To pay salaries of judges of the circuit courts twenty-five

thousand two hundred dollars.

To pay compensation allowed by law to persons who hold the circuit courts when the judges of the circuit courts cannot act, twenty-five hundred dollars.

To pay salaries of judges of criminal and intermediate courts,

twelve thousand and nine hundred dollars.

To pay compensation allowed by law to persons who hold criminal and intermediate courts, when the judge of the same cannot act, five hundred dollars. To pay mileage of judges of the supreme court of appeals, seven hundred and fifty dollars.

To pay mileage of judges of the circuit courts, three thousand

dollars.

To pay salary of the clerk of the supreme court of appeals, one thousand dollars.

Keeper of the Rolls.

To pay salary of the keeper of the rolls, three hundred dollars.

3. The auditor is hereby authorized and directed, when properly demanded, to issue his warrant on the treasury in the same manner he would be required to if each item of the expenditure were directed to be paid to a creditor by name, and no money shall be drawn from the treasury for the purposes herein named during the fiscal year ending September thirtieth, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, and one thousand nine hundred. respectively, beyond the amount hereby appropriated, unless the same is authorized by the constitution or some general law. But the auditor may draw his warrants upon the treasury in favor of the several officers whose salaries and compensation are provided for by this act for services actually rendered by them during the first six months of the fiscal year beginning on the first day of October, one thousand nine hundred, for an amount not to exceed in the aggregate one-half of the sum appropriated for the salary or compensation of such officers, respectively, for the year ending September thirtieth, one thousand nine hundred.

CHAPTER —.

AN ACT making appropriations of public money to pay members and officers of the Legislature in pursuance of the fortysecond section of the sixth Article of the Constitution, for the one day of extended session.

[Passed February 25, 1899. In effect from its passage. Approved February 25, 1899.]

Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:

There shall be and is hereby appropriated for the fiscal year ending September thirtieth, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, the following sums of money for the pay of members and officers of the Legislature for the one day of extended session.

Legislative Department-Senate.

To pay per diem compensation for twenty-six members of the Senate, one day, February twenty-fifth, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, one hundred and six dollars.

To Pay Per Diem Compensation of the Officers, Clerks, Etc.

To pay clerk of Senate, ten dollars.

To pay eight assistant clerks, forty-eight dollars. To pay eleven committee clerks, forty-four dollars.

To pay nine pages, eighteen dollars.

To pay sergeant-at-arms and an assistant sergeant-at-arms, ten dollars.

To pay two doorkeepers and one assistant doorkeeper, twelve

dollars.

To pay one cloak room keeper and assistant cloak room keeper, four dollars.

To pay one librarian, four dollars. To pay one stenographer, six dollars.

House of Delegates.

To pay per diem compensation for seventy-one members of the house of delegates one day, February twenty-fifth, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, two hundred and eightysix dollars.

To pay per diem compensation of officers, assistant clerks,

etc.

To the clerk of the house of delegates, ten dollars.

To eleven assistant clerks, sixty-six dollars.

To extra clerk, six dollars.

To twelve committee clerks, forty-eight dollars.

To one stenographer, four dollars. To two printing clerks, eight dollars.

To one private sccretary to speaker, four dollars.

To sixteen pages, thirty-two dollars. To one sergeant-at-arms, five dollars.

To one assistant sergeant-at-arms, three dollars.

To one doorkeeper, four dollars.

To one gallery doorkeeper, four dollars.

To one librarian, three dollars.

To two cloak room keepers, four dollars.

CHAPTER——

AN ACT making appropriations of public money to pay general charges upon the treasury.

[Passed February 25, 1899. In effect ninety days from its passage. Approved February 25, 1899.]

Be it enacted by the Legislature of West Virginia:

SEC. 1 There shall be and is hereby appropriated out of the State fund for the fiscal year ending September thirtieth, one thousand sight hundred and ninety-nine, the following sums for the purposes as follows:

To pay per diem and expenses of board of pardons, six hundred dollars for each of the years one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine and one thousand nine hundred, to be payable

upon the order of the board.

For construction of tablets to mark the sites of the battle of Pt. Pleasant and Fort Henry, and to pay mileage and per diem of committee, five hundred dollars, payable upon the order of the governor.
