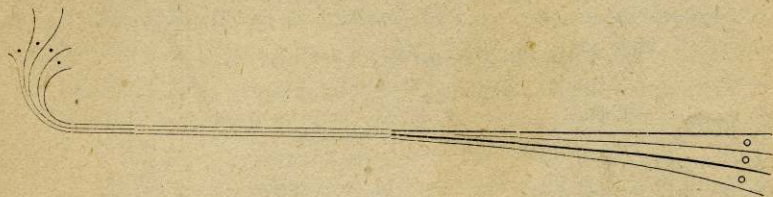

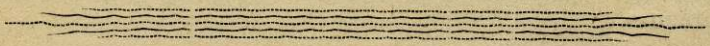

DESIGN.

The purpose of this summer school is threefold :

1. To extend to the young people of Philippi and of the adjacent country the opportunity to prepare for teaching or to get a fair business education.

2. To offer the teachers of Barbour a school in which they can study the Science, the Art, and Methods of Teaching, and at the same time review the branches in which they will be examined.

3. To assist students to prepare for college, or for our University.

SCHOOL BUILDING.

The new Public School building is well ventilated, well arranged, and the finest in this section of the State. It will undoubtedly be the most pleasant place in which a summer school in Philippi has ever been held.

EXPENSES.

Boarding.

Good boarding, room, fuel and light furnished for \$2.00 to \$3.00 a week.

Tuition.

Any five studies in Common School Course	- - -	\$3.50
Any six studies in Teachers' Course	- - - - -	\$4.00
Any five studies in College Preparatory Course, except Surveying and Vocal Music	- - -	\$4.50

Each additional study in any course, 50 cents extra. Students may select their studies from the different courses and they will be classed in the course in which they have a majority of their studies. Special arrangements will be made with those wishing fewer than four studies.

So far as our experience goes, we have found that students usually take too many studies, hence we feel like saying that five or six studies are enough for the most diligent students, unless those studies be review.

Tuition is payable any time before the last week of the term.

GENERAL.

Special attention will be given the subjects of Pedagogy, Methods of Teaching, and School Management. Classes will be taught daily in each.

Model classes, to illustrate methods, will be formed, and the educational questions of the day will be discussed.

Students should bring all their text-books, for reference, if not for class use.

The attention of parents is directed to the advantages offered by our Common School Course. Pupils of this grade will receive careful attention.

Vocal Music will probably be taught at night two times a week. If generally desired, free instructions will be given in

this art during the regular session. We are making arrangements for a good teacher of Instrumental Music. The tuition in these departments will be reasonable.

A class in Plane Surveying will be taught by the actual use of the instrument. An opportunity is here offered to young men to become proficient in this remunerative acquisition. Tuition in this class, \$2.00.

All pupils who join our classes will receive individual attention, and will be enabled to study and recite not a part, but all of the six weeks.

The Teachers' Institute will be held at Philippi just after the close of this school.

Teachers, come and prepare for examination, but most of all for teaching. You cannot expect larger salaries, until you are fitted to earn them. The Summer Normal School aims to prepare you for the honorable profession to which you belong. "As is the teacher, so is the school."

The total expenses of this term to those from a distance *at the most*, need not exceed \$25. Many will receive its advantages at a much smaller figure.

Every student should be present at the opening in order that the daily programme of recitations may be arranged to suit all.

A second session of this school will likely begin Monday, July 14th, 1890.
